1 Ringstrasse



Walking time: 2 hours Vienna's showpiece Ringstrasse boulevard leads us to many of the city's most important sights. Every few meters, another monumental building, magnificent park or culinary hotspot awaits. The 5.3-kilometer, tree-lined stretch is best explored on foot, by bike or on the tram.

A lap of the world's most beautiful boulevard

First things first: you can start your Ringstrasse tour whenever you want, at any point on this almost perfectly circular route. Starting from Schwedenplatz we see the Urania observatory on the left and continue clockwise, in the same direction as the road traffic – but remember that

Stop for a snack at one of the numerous sausage stands on the Ringstrasse, such as Zum scharfen René on Schwarzenbergplatz.

the trams travel in both directions. At the Stubenring section of the Ringstrasse we come to the MAK – Museum of Applied Arts, the first museum to be built on the boulevard, in 1871. A stone's throw away, it's time for coffee and cake at Café Prückel, famed for its 1950s interior decor. Any walk along the Ringstrasse has to include a stroll through the 10-hectare Stadtpark, which is home to the famous gilt statue of the waltz king, Johann Strauss. A look inside the opulent Vienna State Opera – which also offers tours – is



THE RINGSTRASSE THE PERFECT PLACE TO DISCOVER VIENNA another must. Next up, take a breather with a picnic in the beautiful Burggarten or a quick detour to the Palmenhaus café-restaurant. Batteries recharged, we stroll across Heldenplatz taking in the majesty of the Hofburg before heading for the twin museums on the other side of the road – the world-famous Kunsthistorisches Museum Vienna brimming with priceless artworks including the Kunstkammer, and the Naturhistorisches Museum Vienna, which has one of the world's leading natural history collections. The next architectural gem is right next door: the Parliament building, which has echoes of an ancient temple. Following a complete refurbishment until the beginning of 2023, the building is now even shinier than before. Things continue in a Greek vein with the Theseus

Temple in the Volksgarten on the opposite side of the Ringstrasse. This beautiful park is best known for its 3,000 rose bushes. Leaving via the exit on Josef-Meinrad-Platz, we emerge in front of the Burgtheater – the largest theater in the German-speaking countries – and directly opposite City Hall (Rathaus), the political center of the City of Vienna. After a stop at the main building of the University of Vienna (make sure you check out the colonnaded Arkadenhof courtyard), we continue past the Votivkirche church and the stock exchange building (Börse), towards our starting point via Franz-Josef-Kai. Thirsty for more? Then how about some of the "second tier" highlights. Set back slightly from the Ringstrasse, these include the Secession, Justizpalast, Musikverein, Wiener Konzerthaus and many more.

2 Art nouveau



Walking time: 1.5 hours Turn-of-the-century Vienna was shaped by *Jugendstil*, or Austrian art nouveau. To this day, examples from this golden era can be found around virtually every corner. More than any other, it was architect Otto Wagner who changed the face of the city – and his work continues to leave a lasting impression to this day. The artists of the Jugendstil period struck out in a completely new direction considered revolutionary at the time.

Gilt revolution: discover Viennese Jugendstil

Our tour starts at the Ankeruhr. This worldfamous art nouveau musical clock designed by painter Franz Matsch is in fact a walkway that connects two neighboring buildings. A dozen historical figures pass along its face during the course of each 12-hour cycle. At noon each day, they all file out together to music. And if you

This lavish public restroom was the first – and by far the most attractive – below-ground WC to be built during the Jugendstil era. And relaxed, now we can turn our attention to shopping. The Augarten flagship store still sells porcelainware designed by Josef Hoffmann, co-founder of the legendary Wiener Werkstätte. Art-nouveau-inspired handicrafts are the order of the

Cushion covers from Backhausen, vases, jewelry and countless other treasures make the perfect Vienna keepsakes. Our route continues along Kärntner Strasse towards Karlsplatz where the twin Otto Wagner pavilions merit our full attention. This pair of pavilions was designed by the visionary architect Wagner as station buildings for the Stadtbahn railway. One is home to a café, while in the other the Wien Museum has a summer exhibition chronicling Wagner's life and work. And now we come to the most famous of all the Viennese art nouveau buildings - the Secession, whose striking gold dome is visible from a considerable distance. Built in 1898/99 by Joseph Maria Olbrich, the Secession building sent out a clear signal of Viennese Modernism's break with historicism. The Secession acted as the HQ for a group of young artists fronted by Gustav Klimt. Next, we wander along the Wienzeile to the famous apartment buildings designed by Otto Wagner. Built around 1900, they caused a huge stir as they - like the Secession - were a clear statement of intent for nascent Viennese Modernism. The famous Maiolikahaus is clad with floral ceramic tiles, while the facade of the apartment building next door is resplendent with ornamental golden reliefs dreamt up by Koloman Moser. Now it is high time for a break, which we will take in the nearby Rüdigerhof, a café with an idyllic, leafy outdoor seating area that radiates Jugendstil beauty on the outside. The interiors are from the 1950s.





3 First district



Walking time: 1.5 hours The first district – also known as the old town, or simply "the first" – is located inside the Ringstrasse. This part of town has been a bustling center ever since the days of the empire. And today, there is always something to see – in the pedestrianized zones and luxury shopping streets dripping with imperial grandeur, as well as in the city's historic coffeehouses, sidewalk cafes and cultural institutions.

Vienna's heart of gold: a tour of the old town

With the route in hand, we start the tour at Tourist Info on Albertinaplatz. Two top sights are located there right away: the Vienna State Opera, where music is played on 300 days of the year. And the Albertina, where the world-famous field hare by Albrecht Dürer is kept and can be seen irregularly – usually the deceptively real-looking copy is on display. The building itself is also interesting as it sits atop one of the final remains of Vienna's bastion walls.

Close to Schwedenplatz, the Bermuda Triangle – one of the city's oldest nightspots – can be found between Rabensteig and Ruprechtsplatz. Given the sheer volume of bars and restaurants concentrated here, there is something to suit evervone.

After a lap around the Vienna State Opera, the tour continues via Hanuschgasse to the Burggarten. Passing by the Palmenhaus from the time around 1900, we arrive at the Mozart Monument, which looks at a bed of flowers in the shape of a treble clef.

The walk continues to Heldenplatz. Here, one of the biggest palace complexes in the world, the Imperial Palace, comes into view. The Habsburg emperors resided and ruled from there until 1918. Today, it is home to the office of the Federal President, a congress center, the Imperial Treasury, and the Sisi Museum. The route takes us further through the Michaelertor gate onto Michaelerplatz with the church

of the same name, the Loos House, a pioneering structure of Vienna Modernism, and excavations from the Roman era. Past the stables of the Spanish Riding School you will reach the Café Bräunerhof, a traditional coffeehouse with live piano music on Sundays.

Via Plankengasse and across Neuer Markt, we arrive at Kärntner Strasse. This is where shopping hearts beat faster! For example, world-famous chandeliers and glassware are sold at the traditional Viennese manufactory J. & L. Lobmeyr. Many other stores line the city's best-known street, at the end of which stands Vienna's icon: St. Stephen's Cathedral. It was built in the Gothic style

and has four towers. The tallest of these is the south tower at 136.44 meters. Since 1891, another imposing building has stood diagonally opposite: The Palais Equitable, named – as usual – after the client: A New York life insurance company. The walk continues along Graben with its imposing plague column.

We walk along Tuchlauben to the Goldenes Quartier, Vienna's luxury shopping quarter. If you need refreshments and also want to know where to go to see and be seen then take a detour to the Schwarzes Kameel on Bognergasse. Via Hoher Markt and the beautiful Art Nouveau Anker Clock, we arrive at Judengasse. In the many bars of the Bermuda Triangle neighborhood, a young crowd meets ancient city walls. The Ruprechtsviertel with St. Rupert's Church is the oldest city district in Vienna and leads us via the Ruprechtsstiege steps to Schwedenplatz.







Experience Vienna in three-four time

Following in the footsteps of the Waltz King, we start by visiting the original Johann Strauss apartment in Praterstrasse, now a memorial to the musician with an exciting exhibition. Strauss composed The Blue Danube waltz here in 1867. A 20-minute walk takes us to the Stadtpark, where the golden Johann Strauss monument


The State Opera and the Musikverein offer guided tours almost every day. The venues' music, history and architecture fascinate in equal measure.

designed by Edmund Hellmer in 1921 shines out – it is probably Vienna's most photographed landmark. Johann Strauss is also featured in the House of Music, Vienna's interactive sound museum. The Virtual Conductor allows you to conduct the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra to The Blue Danube waltz (a great tip for families!). Johann Strauss himself used to conduct in Vienna's classical music hotspot, the Musikverein. His Blue Danube waltz is a traditional encore at the Vienna Philharmonic's annual New Year's Concert. The Karlskirche (St. Charles' Church), one of the most important baroque sacred buildings in Central Europe, was the venue for Johann Strauss' second wedding. Passing through the hustle and bustle of the Naschmarkt, we head to the MusikTheater an der Wien, the premiere venue for 13 of Strauss' 15 operettas. Today, contemporary opera productions are on the program. Opposite the Secession, the

4 The Waltz King, Johann Strauss



Walking time: 2 hours

Uses public transportation Johann Strauss (II) – the Waltz King, whose 200th birthday is being celebrated in 2025, is ever-present. Through his music all over the world, in his birthplace Vienna at original venues, in his apartment, as well as in state-of-the-art museums. Let's discover Strauss' Vienna with ten stops along the way.

Johann Strauss Museum – New Dimensions plunges visitors into the biography of the Waltz King in an immersive and interactive way. Audio guides lead them through the audiovisual experience. The world premiere of Strauss' only opera, Ritter Pásmán, took place at the Vienna State Opera in 1892. However, he enjoyed success with his operettas. Today, his Fledermaus is always on the program at the turn of the year. At the Opera Ball, the whole of Vienna dances to the beat of his waltzes. Crossing Heldenplatz, the route leads us to the Volksgarten Clubdisco, where Johann Strauss conducted the orchestral version of The Blue Danube waltz for the first time in 1867. The historical columned hall has been preserved. If you fancy a Strauss experience outside the city center, take streetcar D (from Parlament to Rampengasse) to the House of Strauss at Casino Zögernitz: museum, concerts in the Strauss Hall (one of his original performance venues!), a restaurant – what more could you want?





Discover Freud's Vienna

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Around Sigmund Freud's Vienna

Berggasse 19 in the ninth district. Anyone looking to retrace the footsteps of Sigmund Freud automatically gravitates to this address – the birthplace of psychoanalysis. The Sigmund Freud Museum gives us access to both the private apartment and the famous consultation rooms in which Freud worked for almost half a century, between 1891 and 1938. Just a few min-

utes away from Berggasse is the Josephinum, a museum dedicated to the history of medicine in Vienna. A handwritten curriculum vitae and a rare portrait of Sigmund Freud are on display here. The tour continues to the Altes AKH, now the location of the University of Vienna campus. It was at the site of the former general hospital that Freud conducted his research into the anatomy of the brain and the nervous system as a clinical assistant between 1882 and 1885. En route to the university we pass the Sigmund Freud Park, where Freud would often head with his dogs for a short evening walk, and a stone column now stands in his memory. Although Freud never held a chair at the University of Vienna – he would

Duration: 4 hours Uses public transportation Sigmund Freud unlocked the secrets of the human subconscious and revolutionized understanding on how our minds influence our lives. The founding father of psychoanalysis was an archaeologist of the human condition. And fin-de-siècle Vienna was a fertile breeding ground that nurtured his work and unconventional ideas. Let's embark on a journey back in time through Freud's Vienna to gain a deeper insight into his unusual life. not even be promoted to full professor until 1919 – he was able to establish psychoanalysis worldwide.

A statue (no. 97) stands in tribute to the founder of psychoanalysis in the Arkadenhof, the colonnaded courtyard at the University of Vienna. Close to the university is Café Landtmann, where the avid cigar smoker and chess player was a regular patron. Crossing Freyung, Bognergasse, Graben and Kärntner Strasse, we come to Weihburggasse. It was at traditional stationary suppliers Huber & Lerner that Sigmund Freud used to purchase his writing paper. Today, the luxury letterwriting collection preferred by Freud and a faithful reproduction of his personal notepad can be picked up here. Our journey continues through the first district, passing the old university where Sigmund Freud graduated as a doctor

of medicine in 1881, to Café Korb, Freud's second-favorite coffeehouse where the Vienna Psychoanalytic Society came together for its meetings.

We walk across Hoher Markt and along Judengasse, passing the synagogue on Seitenstettengasse before getting the U4 subway at Schwedenplatz. To see the place where Sigmund Freud had the famous vision that would later achieve immortality in The Interpretation of Dreams, our route takes us to one of the landmark hills on the city's outskirts. Back on the U4 we travel to the terminus at Heiligenstadt before getting the 38A bus to the Cobenzl car park. After 15 minutes on foot, we arrive at the Bellevuewiese meadow where a monument to this epochal incident provides a lasting reminder of when the secret behind dreams was revealed to Sigmund Freud.

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

Hip, creative and urban: discover the 7th district

We start at the bottom of Mariahilfer Strasse, right in the MuseumsQuartier (MQ) cultural area. The former imperial court stables are home to the Leopold Museum, the mumok, the ZOOM Children's Museum and 50 other institutions. Fuelled up on culture, we leave

the MQ via Hof 7 (at the Architekturzentrum Wien) and marvel at the Volkstheater, a historicist building that houses one of the most important theater stages in the German-speaking world. We walk up Burggasse, where the picturesque Spittelberg is just a few meters away on the left. The well-preserved Biedermeier houses in the narrow alleyways are beautiful to behold. We stay on Burggasse and stop at St. Ulrich's Church, take a walk around the baroque sacred building and explore the charming pubs and stores. Walking along Kirchengasse and Siebensterngasse, we end up on Neubaugasse, the heart of the 7th district, but first turn into Westbahnstrasse. Many of the stores here sell cameras. Photography enthusiasts should stop off at WestLicht, which offers temporary exhibitions on modern and historical photography. We now head back towards Neubaugasse via Schottenfeldgasse, Seidengasse and Hermanngasse. This area will cause the heart of every foodie and shopping fan to beat a little faster. Many of the stores offer unique and sustainable products - be sure to plan

6 Vienna Neubau



Waking time: 2 hours Welcome to Vienna Neubau, one of the liveliest districts in Vienna. This Grätzel, as Vienna's neighborhoods are called, is a veritable cultural, shopping and culinary paradise. It is progressive and cosmopolitan, but also extremely arty and hip – more so than almost any other Viennese district. Surprises can be found on every street corner here.

in some time here! Walking along Lindengasse (locally sourced produce is available at the weekly market every Wednesday), we arrive at the Vienna Furniture Museum, where thousands of exhibits tell the story of Habsburg home decor. Once we arrive on Mariahilfer Strasse, we can catch our breath in the over 100-year-old English Cinema Haydn, which screens original versions of blockbuster and arthouse films. We walk down the pedestrianized Barnabitengasse to the House of the Sea. What makes it unique is that it is housed in an anti-aircraft tower dating from the Second World War, which has been extended several times, and is home to over 10,000 animals, mainly – but not exclusively – fish and reptiles. We have now arrived in the 6th district, which has every bit as much to offer as the 7th district.

Shalom!

We start our journey on Stephansplatz and first follow Rotenturmstrasse to reach Seitenstettengasse. This is where Vienna's most important synagogue is located: the Stadttempel, which was spared from the November pogroms (Kristallnacht) of 1938. We continue to Hoher

Markt. Then we turn into the narrow Schultergasse, which brings us directly to Judenplatz. This square was the focal point of Jewish life in Vienna in the Middle Ages. Here you can see the foundations of a synagogue that was destroyed in the 15th century: the Judenplatz Museum allows visitors to see these earliest relics of Judaism in Vienna. A Holocaust memorial by British artist Rachel Whiteread is located on the square itself. Leaving Judenplatz, we walk to Graben and turn into Dorotheergasse, where the Jewish Museum Vienna awaits. The museum houses an impressive per-

manent exhibition on Jewish life in Vienna. We carry on our stroll to Michaelerplatz. From there we head along Herrengasse and Schottengasse to Schottentor, where we turn into Universitätsstrasse and walk to Otto-Wagner-Platz. The Shoah Wall of Names is the largest holocaust memorial in Vienna. These walls are

7 Jewish Vienna



Walking time: 2.5 hours Vienna and Judaism are inseparably entwined. The Jewish community has had a formative influence on Vienna since the Middle Ages, be it in culture, science or business. This city walk guides you to the most important locations of Jewish Vienna. You'll find unique museums and memorials, as well as whole neighborhoods and even cemeteries.

engraved with the names of the approximately 65,000 Jews who were murdered in Austria. The walking tour continues along Schwarzspanierstrasse into Berggasse. Sigmund Freud founded the discipline of psychoanalysis at Berggasse 19. His former home and practice are now the site of the Sigmund Freud Museum, which is dedicated to the life and work of Vienna's most famous Jewish-born scientist. We follow Berggasse and turn into Servitengasse and continue on to Seegasse. An insider tip awaits you at Seegasse 11: the Rossau Jewish Cemetery. It is located in the inner courtyard of a retirement home. This is why we enter "Haus Rossau" through the main entrance and go straight through the foyer (not always accessible due to construction work). We stroll on to Rossauer Lände and cross the Danube Canal. Then we follow the promenade to Otto Wagner's Schützenhaus, arriving on Herminengasse via the entrance to the U2 subway. Now we are in the Karmeliterviertel, the heart of Jewish life in Vienna. Passing the Karmelitermarkt we then reach Karmeliterplatz. From there it is only a few minutes to the Taborstrasse U2 subway station.

ACCESSIBILITY

The capital's public transportation and stations have been adapted for people with restricted mobility. Virtually all underground stations and trains offer step-free access. Vienna's buses are all step-free, low-floor vehicles. The electronic displays at tram stops let passengers know when the next wheelchair-friendly tram is coming by displaying a small wheelchair symbol next to the service number. Braille maps of the city are available from Tourist Info Vienna on Albertinaplatz.

STORE OPENING TIMES

Important: the vast majority of stores in Vienna are closed on Sundays and public holidays. Exceptions: various supermarkets at major stations are open. As a rule, stores in the main shopping streets such as Kärntner Strasse, Graben, Kohlmarkt and Mariahilfer Strasse are open Monday to Friday from 09:00–18:30 and between 09:00 and 17:00 or 18:00 on Saturdays. Some stores are open until 20:00 on Thursdays.
